A Volunteer's Story

It all started for me by attending Holiday Open House at Sea Biscuit Wildlife Shelter. I had just retired and moved with my husband to Oak Island. Coincidence or Fate? We chose a home near Sea Biscuit.

I have always loved wildlife especially birds, and song birds are very dear to my heart. That day I was able to meet many volunteers and the director. I fell in love with her passion and knowledge of all the birds in her care and how effortlessly she could tell you the stories of each and every bird there. By the end of the event, I knew I would be getting much more involved with this wonderful organization.

Little did my husband Mark know at that time but soon he would also be looking forward to the times he could help with the many tasks involved in the maintenance required to provide a safe environment for all the birds. We have shared some special adventures picking up injured birds and working with triage and subsequent care for the birds. Together, we now have had the experiences of helping disentangle an injured

pelican from a nasty mess of fishing line to capturing a lost Screech Owl from under a Beach House rental. No matter what we are doing at the shelter such as cleaning the pelican pool, mowing, or creating new enclosures you are guaranteed to leave happier and more motivated. You might be a little tired but interacting with the birds and seeing them heal and then finally watch them fly away to their new life is indescribable.

I have been volunteering now for almost 2 years. This spring I was given the honor to care for our tiniest patients, orphan song birds. They come in so small, just a gram or two. Sometimes they require the use of an incubator, and just like a baby they need frequent formula feedings each day. They grow so fast from hatchling, to nestling, chick, fledgling, and then immature juvenile. It's a very busy season, and I am so fortunate that I have had the opportunity to experience these life stages close up. We are lucky to live in this area with a plethora of song bird species. Sea Biscuit Wildlife Shelter is a vital and important part of our coastal community. I am proud to have had hands on experience with blue birds, mockingbirds, woodpeckers, grackles, mourning doves, titmice, finches, vireo's and everyone's favorite Carolina wrens.

Because the organization is sustained primarily through volunteer efforts and monetary donations, the opportunity to contribute is huge, and the needs are ongoing. I would encourage anyone with interest to contact Mary Ellen Rogers directly to learn how they can get involved.

- Young female Osprey from Myrtle Beach in on 9/28 and released on 10/30
- Adult Barred Owl from Southport released 10/12
- Barred Owl from Elizabethtown, NC on 10/8 released on Oak Island 10/30
- Royal Tern from Shallotte on 10/15 released on Oak Island on 10/30
- Brown Pelican from Sunset Beach on 10/23 released at Lockwood Folly Inlet 11/01


